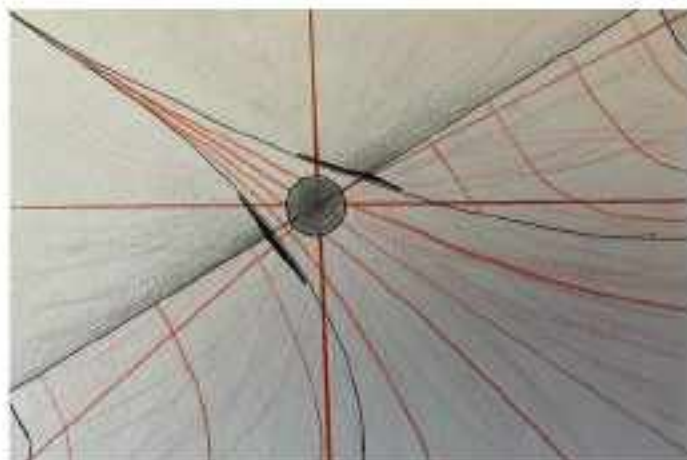

Initial Inspiration

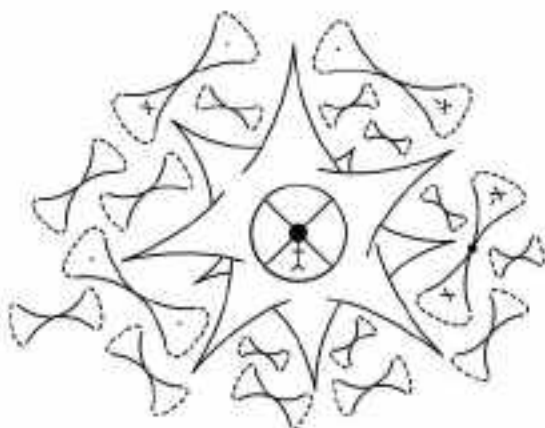
